President's Letter

HAPPY NEW YEAR! I hope everyone had a happy holiday with friends and family! Members celebrated the season early with the annual Holiday Brunch at the lovely home of Phil and Mary Suess, with our thanks for hosting!

If you missed it the State of Community meeting, it is clear that the economic turn down impact is very local. As described by Mayor Gresk, CUSD 200 Board President Johnson, and Park District Board President Luetkehans, along with some good news budget issues are a major concern. Mayor Gresk indicates that the council will need to find a way to reduce spending or increase revenue. Look for more information on public hearings related a Property Tax Levy Ordinance. According to President Johnson CUSD #200 is looking to shave \$7 million from its budget and also reports and Board President Luetkehans indicates that the park district will make budget cuts to avoid future financial problems. League encourages transparency and openness with the community as the decision making process related to budget issues continue.

Thank you to Olga Rammer and the Finance Drive Committee for raising \$4200 from supporters and members this year. Thank you to everyone who gave, too!

The Membership Drive is also concluded for the year with our membership at 100 members. Congratulations to Denise Niesman for working on dues collection. One of the nice things about this is the ability to send 2 delegates to the 2010 LWV Convention in Atlanta. Thanks, Denise.

What's going on in the league right now?

The League of Women Voters of Wheaton and Glen Ellyn are co-sponsoring a **Candidate Forum** along with the Chambers of Commerce of Wheaton, Warrenville, West Chicago, and Carol

Stream. To allow more time to question candidate in contested races, the forum will take place over 2 nights, January 6th and 7th.

James Carr (R-4), Al Murphy (R-6), Roger Kotecki (R-6) and Shannon Burns (D-6) have committed to attend on January 6th.

Candidates for DuPage County Board Chairman and DuPage County Board District 4 & 6 have been invited to participate on January 7th. Board Chairman candidates Carole A. Cheney (D), Dan Cronin (R), Debra L. Olson (R), Gary Grasso (R), Carole Pankau (R) and County Board candidates Tom Wendorf (D-4), Thomas R. Grimston (D-4), Jerry "JR" McBride (R-4), Brad Webb (R-4), Dave Barry (D-6), Robert L. "Bob" Larsen (R-6) and Paul Darrah (R-6) have committed to attend on January 7th.

Both forums will be held at the Wheaton Park District Community Center, Memorial Room, at 1777 S. Blanchard Road, Wheaton reception at 6:30, forum begins at 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m

District 200 Appoints Acting Superintendent

On October 22, 2009, the Board of Education for District 200 appointed Dr. Charles Baker as Acting Superintendent for the remainder of the 2009-10 school year.



Dr. Baker is a familiar face in District 200 and brings a wealth of experience and talent to this new position. In 1972, he joined the district as an English and social studies teacher at Edison Middle School and remained there for 11 years. In 1983, he transferred to Wheaton Central High School as the English department chair.

In 2 years, he became assistant principal, and in 1988 was named principal. In 1992, the school relocated, becoming Wheaton Warrenville South High School. Dr. Baker remained principal until 2004. Following his retirement as principal, he joined the central office administration as director of secondary education.

On accepting the acting superintendent position, Dr. Baker commented, "My tenure in District 200 has provided a strong foundation for an understanding of the issues we face. We should never forget that this district is a high-performance school district, and the reason for that is the support it receives from the community, the eagerness of our students, the quality of our faculty and staff, and a Board of Education committed to maintaining that tradition."

The Board of Education is moving forward immediately to secure a permanent superintendent and hopes to name that individual by mid to late spring with a starting date of July 1, 2010.

Environment

Good news: On December 5, 2009, the City of Wheaton kicked-off holiday lights recycling. Maybe you bought environmentally friendly "LED" lights for your tree this year. Don't discard your old lights. You can drop off your holiday lights any time between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday at the Public Works Building, 821 W. Liberty Drive. Look for signs directing you to the holiday light recycling area just

inside the gate. The Public Works Department will accept lights for recycling through Feb. 15, 2010.

Bad news: Due to a new state law, the monthly electronics recycling in Wheaton has been discontinued, as of 12/5/09.

Just news: The Environment Committee is monitoring two current issues in our area. One issue is the cutting down of tree along the Illinois Prairie Path and Great Western Trails by Commonwealth Edison, and what is left behind. Commonwealth Edison does not want to replace the trees they've cut. Get more information about the trees and trails at www.friendsofthegreatwesterntrails.com

The second issue in the news is Navistar's plan to build a diesel engine testing facility in Lisle, on Lucent land currently leased by DuPage County, DuPage County Forest Preserve and the Wheaton Park District. This issue could intersect LWV positions for environment, health and public policy. There has been a lot of press on this issue, and if you Google "Navistar and Lisle", you will find plenty of reading material.

Healthcare

The Health Committee is monitoring Congress' progress in passing a Health Insurance Reform Act. Now that both bills are passed, they go to "conference;" House and Senate leaders resolve differences between the two bills and present a single bill to their respective chambers. That is when we as League members, called to action by the LWVUS, or as private citizens, can call our Representatives and Senators and urge them to vote "aye" on the bill that comes out of conference. That is the bill that will go to President Obama's desk for signing or vetoing. He hopes to have a bill signed before the annual State of the Union address on 1/20/2010. As you read this VOTER, our legislators should be returning to the Capital after their break. Now is the time to make our voices heard:

On December 4, 2009, Diane Niesman and Roberta Jacobson attended a meeting at Good Samaritan Hospital, of the Healthcare Council of the Western Suburbs, sponsored by the Metropolitan Chicago Healthcare Council. An update on H1N1 virus was presented. While the numbers of new cases is down, another spike is expected. Call 1-866-311-1123 for an appointment at the DuPage County Health Department to get the H1N1 flu shot. They have hours seven days a week. Also, remember **the three C's:** **CLEAN** (wash your hands) **COVER** (cough & sneeze into your sleeve) and **CONTAIN** (stay at home if you are sick--don't spread it around).

The second agenda item at the meeting was handgun violence prevention. The speaker, Mark Walsh, who has been lobbying Illinois legislators for 13 years for sensible hand gun laws, recognized the Wheaton League's efforts at last year's forum at Wheaton North HS during his question and answer session. He spoke of how the forum was "hijacked" by NRA members.

Housing

The League is represented in the DuPage Housing Action Coalition by several LWV members, who contribute to the monthly discussions. DHAC had a workshop in which leaders considered the issues in affordable and fair housing, with an eye to shaping DHAC legislative initiatives for the coming legislative year. Issues among those brought to the Coalition for consideration included fair housing, supportive housing, condominiums, and affordability.

We observe the Wheaton City Council regular sessions and the planning sessions. We watch for movement on one priority of the Council, affordable housing. However the budget issue is currently top priority, given the \$1.5 million shortfall for the year.

In addition, the Housing Commission for the City of Wheaton is working out ways to better inform the residents of Wheaton of the housing assistance available to seniors of lower income.

It was created by 3 young filmmakers who use the power of stories to change lives around the world. Wheaton City Council Highlights

Meeting: Nov. 2, 2009

Overview of Fiscal Year 2009 Audit Presented

Frederick Lantz of Sikich LLP presented an overview of the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for the Fiscal Year Ending April 30, 2009. Lantz noted that the amount it cost the City to provide all services to its residents was slightly over \$55 million. He also explained some changes reflected in the report due to fund transfers and other similar changes. Lantz suggested the City consider trying to increase its amount of unreserved funds, as fund balances have been drawn down by the continuing economic decline and increases needed to fund pension requirements.

Meeting: Nov. 16, 2009

Council Approves Commission Appointments

The Council approved the reappointment of Vickie Miller to a three-year term on the Community Relations Commission, the appointment of Nancy Allured and the reappointment of Hanna Self to three-year terms on the Environmental Improvement Commission, and the appointment of Steph McGrath to the Wheaton Downtown Design Review Board as the Historic Commission representative.

Meeting: Dec. 7, 2009

Council Congratulates State Champions



Mayor Michael Gresk presented a proclamation to Coach Muhitch and members of the Wheaton Warrenville South High School Varsity Football Team making Dec. 8, 2009, Wheaton Warrenville South High School Football State 7A Championship Day in Wheaton. The team defeated Glenbard West High School to win the 7A state title.

Mayor Gresk also presented the team with a state championship sign for the school to display and a photo showing the City of Wheaton flag and the school's pennant flying over Glen Ellyn's Village Hall. Mayor Gresk and Glen Ellyn Village President Mark Pfefferman made an agreement before the championship game that the municipality whose team lost would fly the opposing team and municipality's flags at their city/village hall.

Council Presented with First Reading of 2009 Tax Levy Ordinances

The City Council received the first reading of the 2009 Tax Levy Ordinances. City Manager Rose stated the general purposes levy has increased by 7.33 percent while the net debt service levy has increased 0.61 percent. The revenue generated from the property tax levy will be received in the second half of 2010. The ordinance levies a total dollar amount of \$20,759,782. The 2009 proposed tax levy will produce an estimated tax rate of 0.7964, an increase from the 2008 rate of 0.7682. This estimate is based on the City's equalized assessed value (EAV) increasing 3 percent. A public hearing about the proposed property tax levy will take place at 7 p.m. Monday, Dec. 14 in the Council Chambers of City Hall. The Council will formally consider the levy at its Dec. 21 City Council Meeting.

Meeting: Dec. 21, 2009

City Sets Goal for Water Usage Reduction

Environmental Improvement Commission Chair Ted Witte accepted a proclamation from Mayor Michael Gresk stating the City of Wheaton will work toward achieving a 10

percent reduction in water use (expressed in gallons per person per day) during the next 10 years. The DuPage Water Commission encourages cities to participate in the water conservation program.

Council Approves Property Tax Levy

The Wheaton City Council voted 6-1 in favor of an ordinance that establishes the 2009 property tax levy. The ordinance levies a property tax rate that is 7.33 percent greater than the previous year. The debt service levy increased by 0.61 percent. The revenue generated from the property tax levy will be received in the second half of 2010. The ordinance levies a total dollar amount of \$20,759,782. The 2009 proposed tax levy will produce an estimated tax rate of 0.7964, an increase from the 2008 rate of 0.7682.

Resident Reappointed to Commission

The City Council approved the reappointment of Phil Landrum to a three-year term on the Environmental Improvement Commission.

Council Backs Energy Efficiency Grant Strategy

The City Council approved a resolution backing the strategy presented by City staff regarding the use of a federal energy efficiency and conservation grant. The City is being awarded more than \$500,000 through a federal Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant, for which it must submit a plan for the use of the funds to the Department of Energy in January 2010. City staff formed a Strategic Plan Development Committee, which created the energy strategy plan and presented to the Council.
