

1. We are supporting the **Illinois Fair Map Amendment** initiative– the LWV of Illinois leads the way with a petition drive to secure the signatures required to put the amendment on the November ballot. We need your help!

### **How can you help?**


## The League of Women Voters Through the Decades!

### The 1920s:

#### Organization:

Since the League had inherited its structure from the National American Women Suffrage Association, in 1920 it was a federation of affiliated state Leagues, most of which had been in existence as state headquarters of the NAWSA. State Leagues were the keystone of the League's structure, and had the responsibility for organizing local Leagues. By 1924, the National League was organized in 346 of 433 congressional districts. Twenty-three state Leagues and 15 city Leagues maintained regular business headquarters, nearly all with one or more paid staff. A convention, held annually at first and then later biennially, of the state League representatives selected a program that for many years was national, state and local all in one. Local Leagues were not represented at the conventions and the state League delegates also chose the national officers and directors:



*to the latter the Leagues looked for leadership which molded them together into one effective organization. The National Board continued the practice of extensive field work which had been so successful in the suffrage movement. Its members carried the enthusiasm and inspiration for the whole League to the remotest and smallest towns. The League had from the beginning the dual advantages of grassroots and central thinking, planning and leadership. That the League structure ran somewhat parallel to the structure of our federal system was an additional advantage because it provided experience which made our form of government more understandable.*

During its first two decades, the League concentrated on study and getting needed legislation passed. All League program at the national, state and local levels was proposed by national Board program departments and standing committees and then authorized by the national convention. The national Board furnished study materials for all national and some state items. This led to national Board and staff expertise and legislative successes that overshadowed the goal of political education of the public at large. The structure that developed in the departments and committees of the National League tended to build up special interests and specialists in subject matter. But there was a sense that another facet of League purpose - development of the well rounded, effective individual - suffered by comparison.

#### Issues:

League President Maud Wood Park called the first League program adopted in 1920 a kettle of eels. And no wonder! It contained some 69 items grouped in broad subject areas: child welfare, education, the home and high prices, women in gainful occupations, public health and morals, and independent citizenship for married women! The League's first major national legislative success was the passage of the Sheppard-Towner Act providing federal aid for maternal and child care programs.

The League also set up classes to train volunteer teachers for citizenship schools. And the League organized institutes to study defects in our system of government, initiated "Know Your Town"

surveys, candidate questionnaires and meetings, and nationwide get-out-the-vote campaigns activities. In 1928 the League sponsored "Meet the Candidates," the first national radio broadcast of a candidate forum. Voters service efforts remain a hallmark of the League's services to the electorate today and laid the foundation for the efforts that make up the League's education program - from candidate debates and candidate questionnaires produced by Leagues throughout the country, to the myriad projects funded through the League of Women Voters Education Fund, which was founded in 1957. ## **The 1930s:**

### **Organization:**

The depression of the 1930s and the onset of World War II brought far-reaching change to the League. Membership fell from 100,000 in 1924 to 44,000 in 1934. The National League's budget was cut in half, necessitating a major reduction in staff and services to Leagues. Perhaps the most important change was that because of gas rationing, League members started meeting in small groups in their neighborhoods to discuss fundamental issues. These issues included the threat to democracy itself and the importance of the informed individual to the success of democracy. Grassroots activity thus was firmly institutionalized as a way of assessing concerns, studying and strategizing.

### **Issues:**

League members worked successfully for enactment of the Social Security and Food and Drug Acts, as well as the TVA. In 1934, when federal and state government agencies were hiring thousands of employees to administer the new social and economic laws, the League launched a nationwide campaign in support of the merit system for selecting government personnel. In those years the League was the only national organization acting consistently for the merit system. And due, at least in part, to League efforts, legislation passed in 1938 and 1940 removed hundreds of federal jobs from the spoils system and placed them under Civil Service.

## Illinois Fair Map Amendment Talking Points

RE: ILLINOIS FAIR MAP AMENDMENT

Dear Fellow League Members,

If you can do one thing to help end corruption in Illinois and ensure that voters pick their legislators rather than allowing legislators to pick their constituents, then the League needs your help. For the next ten weeks, February to early April, League members are being asked to gather signatures on a petition in support of the Fair Map Amendment.

This is the first step in taking Illinois back from the politicians and we cannot do it without your help. Please contact Jan Czarnik at the League office, [jczarnik@lwvil.org](mailto:jczarnik@lwvil.org), and tell her that you are not happy with Illinois government and you would like to participate in this effort. Or visit the Illinois Fair Map Amendment website at [www.ilfairmap.com](http://www.ilfairmap.com) to download petitions. It is very important that you follow the rules and download the petition for your election jurisdiction. We are asking our members to set a goal of 30 to 50 signatures which is three to five petition sheets.

This can be easy and fun. Plan a petition party; invite your friends and neighbors. Carry a petition with you at all times. You never know whom you will meet. Tell us your stories. Let us know your adventures getting signatures. We will publish some of your stories in our next Voter.

Don't know what to say? Here are some talking points:

### THE PROBLEM

- For the last three decades, Illinois legislators have created districts that ensure their re-election by drawing their own maps behind close doors.
- The political party drawing the map, Republicans or Democrats, is decided by drawing its name out of a hat.
- Districts are drawn to protect incumbents from the political party which is drawing the map.

### THE SOLUTION

Based on a Citizen's Commission Proposal (Illinois Reform Commission)

- Legislators DO NOT draw maps. An Independent Commission does.
- Maps will be drawn in an open and transparent process, with public input.
- Specific criteria will be used to draw maps to protect minority voting rights and to draw districts which are more open to challengers.
- Maps are drawn for people, not politicians.

### THE PROCESS

The Legislature will not change the system, so citizens must.  
We need 500,000 signatures of registered voters by the middle of April.



## **Redistricting Reform that Restores Democracy to Illinois**

For the last three decades, legislators have created their own districts after drawing a name out of a hat!

Illinois is the ONLY state in the nation that allows this magic trick to determine such an important issue.

**We need your help** to change this process and take it from the legislators and put it in the hands of an independent commission in order to make redistricting more transparent, fair, and accessible to the public.

### **Education, State Fiscal Policy & School Funding** Joan Fefferman

Summary of January 26, 2010 Meeting of the Wheaton LWV Education Committee and District 200 School board and LWV member, Barbara Intihar-

#### Topics: Dr. Drury's Resignation Agreement & related issues

Attendees: Joan Fefferman, Jan Kay, Helen White, Roberta Jacobson, Missey Wilhelm  
The Education Committee met with Barbara Intihar to discuss Dr. Drury's resignation and the current search for his replacement. The actions of the school board in the last half of 2009 left many in the community with the feeling that the school board was trying to hide something related to the resignation. We wanted to know what really led to the July 1, 2009 signing his contract and the agreement to part ways less than two months later.

In addition, there was a concern about the payment of salary to Dr. Drury in addition to sums agreed to in his resignation agreement, the payment of retirement funds owed Dr. Catalani, and payment of the salary for Dr. Baker. These were not previously addressed by the school board.

From the conversation with Barb, it seemed clear that much of the problem resulted from the odd timing of the contract renewal, which came before the goal setting process was complete. In the public mind the problem was likely compounded by the controversy over the presidential speech to schoolchildren in early September. Barb said that this though had nothing to do with the disagreement with Dr. Drury.

Barb covered fiscal concerns by explaining that Dr. Drury's salary would continue until March 9, 2010, when his resignation takes effect. A severance payment of \$60K will be paid within 30 days after that. Dr. Baker is paid according to his current contract agreement. The retirement package for Dr. Catalani does not impact this situation. That should dispel any concern that the district is paying for more than one superintendent salary.

The committee suggested that, in spite of the school board apprehension over how to address the concerns of the community or the press, a little more openness and transparency would have gone a long way. We thought opening the search for the new superintendent to key stakeholders and the community was a good thing. We expressed the hope that the school board would include an outline of future goals in the interview process for candidates for superintendent and would change the timing of when goals are finalized, so that contract renewal comes after goal setting, if at all.

There was a good give and take. The committee appreciated Barb's honesty and willingness to meet with us again any time.

The Wheaton LWV received an invitation from Andy Johnson, President of CUSD 200 Board of Education to meet with the finalists for Superintendent on February 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup>. Joan Fefferman participated in questioning the 2 candidates that were finalists in the superintendent search at those meetings. To maintain confidentiality, those interviewing the finalists were asked not to speak about the candidates in public.

## **Environment**

The village of Lisle and Navistar are still being monitored by the public regarding Navistar's plans to have diesel fuel storage tanks and truck testing facilities on former Lucent land. The possible jobs and tax revenue generated by Navistar does not appear to be winning over the environmental and health concerns of the public, at this time.

Another environmental issue in the news is the potential invasion of carp in Lake Michigan. DNA has already been found in Lake Michigan water. States, other than Illinois, which border Lake Michigan are pressuring the Obama administration to make Chicago close their locks between Lake Michigan and the Chicago River. An open hearing was held at the Federal Building in Chicago on 2/12/09. There will surely be more news in future months.

Some folks willfully deny that global climate change (formerly known as global warming) exists and point to extreme weather as evidence of their opinion. For example: Senator DeMint said, "It is going to keep snowing in DC until Al Gore cries Uncle." The Glen Ellyn LWV's March 11 program is on the delivery of mental health care services in DuPage County. It is set for at 7:30 PM at the Civic Center on Duane. Speakers will include Tony Zipple, chief executive officer of Thresholds, and Dave Christiansen who is head of the Health Department, Division of Mental Health. The program should be really good and informative, and the date does not conflict with Wheaton's LWV unit program about the Hubble property.

## **Housing** Jan Kay

The legislative session in Springfield is now underway. We will be watching a newly introduced Bill regarding the limitations placed on condo owners who want to rent their unit out to tenants who have been approved for rentals by the owner. Rep. Sandra Pihos and Sen. Cronin have each filed a Bill. The House Bill is in Committee and the Senate Bill is awaiting assignment.

Particularly this Bill affects not-for-profit organizations who own units within Associations that have voted to permit owner only occupied units. The Associations may have taken this action years after the not-for-profit purchased the units. One such organization is Community Housing Association of DuPage, CHAD, which owns many such units

around the County to provide affordable housing to individuals and families who cannot afford market rate homes.

Wheaton League is observing the Hubble Advisory Committee in its search for a recommendation regarding the use of the former school property. During their recent meeting, they heard the report of the consultants who researched possible uses and also possible problems with which the Committee will grapple, such as the flood plain. League is interested for at least two reasons; enhancing the Central Business District as well as the possibilities for housing for individuals and families of modest income.

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**Wheaton City Council Highlights**  
**Meeting: Feb. 1, 2010**

**Council Advises City Attorney to Prepare Variation Ordinance**

The City Council received a report from City staff regarding a stormwater ordinance variance for Heartland Food Corp., the owners of the Burger King at 2191 W. Roosevelt Road. During a recent review of an adjacent site, the City's Engineering staff determined that the existing conditions of the Burger King site no longer conform with the stormwater management plans that were approved in 1989 when the site was first developed. The Council advised the City Attorney to prepare an ordinance that would accept a plan to correct the non-conforming stormwater management condition on the property.

**Meeting: Feb. 16, 2010**

**Council Approves Walgreens Development**

The City Council passed an ordinance allowing for a new Walgreens Drug Store to be built at 2020 S. Naperville Road. Plans call for a single drive-through lane and involve the reconfiguration of access drives to the store. A representative for Centrum Properties stated the existing Burger King in that location will be razed, and the Walgreens store is expected to open in the fall.

**Council Addresses Possible Zoning Ordinance Amendment**

The City Council received a report from the Planning & Zoning Board proposing a text amendment to the Zoning Ordinance in reference to senior housing developments. The amendment includes a new definition for senior housing developments, creates density and parking requirements for each category of senior housing, and reduces the maximum building heights in the R-6, R-7 and O-R Zoning Districts. The Council directed the City Attorney to prepare an ordinance for their consideration.
