President's Letter

As I am writing this note it is mid-October, rainy and quite a bit of frost on the pumpkin this year already. Remember last year when the early fall temperatures were in the 80's? Still, it is my favorite time of year; putting the garden to bed, bringing in the house plants, plugging in the heater for the birdbath, but most of all enjoying the bounty of color and the cold crisp mornings.

If you missed it, the education program meeting in October on school funding and CUSD 200 budgeting issues was very interesting and informative. Kathy Nesburg, Fiscal Policy specialist expert for LWVIL reviewed the league position on education and provided an overview of the funding situation from the State of Illinois and policies resulting from the ARRA (American Recovery and Reinvestment Act). Bill Farley, Asst. Superintendent Business Operations, discussed several issues, from complications with our school budget stemming from local issues, to state budget problems and to the ARRA funding implementation. Bill was joined by Linda Knicker, Asst. Superintendent for Special Services, who special needs.

What's going on in the league right now?

This time last year the league was swamped with election activity: voter registration, Mock elections in the high schools, candidate forums, and the CON-CON was on the ballot. Going green was on our minds as we moved to an electronic Voter saving trees and dollars. What a difference a year makes.

LWVIL continues to push for Campaign Finance Reform Legislation by insisting that good Campaign Finance Reform legislation with contribution limits be available for a vote when the veto session begins on October 14th. The Governor and legislative leaders have committed to working together to come up with a strong bill but continuing pressure is needed to insure results. In support of the state efforts, the Wheaton League participated with the four other leagues in the county, the College of DuPage, the Citizen Advocacy Center and DuPage county in THE DUPAGE COUNTS Kickoff event on 10/7 to educate leaders from community organizations that reach out to all parts of the county on the importance of the census. Workgroup Synopsis

Diversity

We continue to work with the College of DuPage regarding a collaborative sponsorship of regular multicultural discussions on current topics. After meeting with the Latino Ethnic Awareness group in September, several students expressed interest in participating on a Colorful Discussions steering committee. The Diversity team plans to meet with faculty members in October.

Education, State Fiscal Policy & School Funding

The Wheaton League of Women Voters hosted two speakers at 7:30 PM on October 15th at the Wheaton Community Center. The first speaker was Ms. Kathy Nesburg, a LWVIL (League of Women Voters of Illinois) Fiscal Policy/School Funding specialist and an Oak Park lawyer. "Not since 1989 have taxes been raised in the State and this is far too long." She covered topics that ranged from the bankruptcy of Illinois budget to the uneven monies applied per pupil within the state of Illinois for education based on where you live. Where we live and raise our children can have an incredible impact on how we educate our children. Anywhere from \$5,000.00 to \$22,000.00 per student is being spent on education per child per year, depending on where one lives in the state. If the people of the state do not give the schools enough money the job will not be done right, she claimed. Kathy stated that the gaping holes in the budget will be discussed by the State legislature after the primaries in February. She said that we should all hope that it is not too late!

Mr. Bill Farley, District 200's Assistant Superintendent for Business Operations followed, along with the Assistant Superintendent for special education for District 200, Ms. Linda Knicker. Bill's presentation stated some facts about the District that were sometimes surprising to the audience. The District has 13,500 pre-K through 12th grade students with 71 different spoken languages. It educates 44 students between the ages of 18 to 23. It employs 2,734 individuals in the district, yet only 1,200 of those employees live within district boundaries. 9,000 students are bussed daily, and 3,590 lunches and 350 breakfasts are served each day. 2905 students fall under low income guidelines. The average ACT score is 24, with all Juniors being required to take the exam; there were 22 National Merit Semifinalists in 2008. The attendance rate is 95.2% and the graduation rate is 98.1%. Enrollment for District 200 has steadily declined in the years spanning 2001 to 2009. Tax revenues are greatly affected by Tax Caps which restrict the amount of the increase of the prior year tax extension by the Consumer Price Index or 5%, whichever is less. Last year the Consumer Price Index was 0.1%; which has greatly reduced the revenues the schools can receive.

Ms. Knicker addressed the uses of ARRA (American Recovery and Reinvestment) funds in CUSD 200. The funds are being used for instructional materials, support personnel, and instructional programs that ensure improvement in student outcomes. The funds are being used for seed money for programs for "at risk" students. Ms. Knicker claimed that "ARRA funds are going to take money away from the District if we do not do it right!" The "big deal is sustainability" for these programs (special education) once we have the start up monies. She reported that a student told her that the special

education programs in the District had saved his life. Ms. Knicker wanted us to "believe in it" (the programs), as they help kids live, not just now, but for their adult lives.

The Wheaton League of Women Voters usually has unit meetings on the 3rd Thursday of the month at the Wheaton Community Center on the 2nd floor at 7:30 PM with coffee being served at 7:00. The meetings and the presentations are open to the public.

Housing Jan Kay

The Illinois legislature is in the Veto session now. There is still one Bill that the housing advocates are following closely. HB 821 is concerned with whether condo homes must be only OWNER occupied, or if they may be rented out by the owners. This Bill is sponsored by Rep. Sandra Pihos and Sen. Dan Cronin, and others from around the State.

HB 821 originated through the work of a non-profit housing organization, Community Housing Association of DuPage [CHAD]. They have been able to purchase many condos around the County and then lease them at affordable rates to tenants who cannot afford the market rents. Two Wheaton League Housing Action members are on the Board of CHAD and have worked diligently alongside of the executive director, Bob Wahlgren, and advocates around the State, such as Housing Action II, to keep the housing option of condo rentals available. This has been possible for as long as CHAD has owned their condos. Presently the Bill is in the Senate and probably will not be heard during the Veto session.

The Housing Action committee continues to work closely with the DuPage Housing Action Coalition. They also continue to monitor the Wheaton City Council, in case there

are opportunities to work for more modest income housing within the City. Though housing prices seem to be down now, often the income levels are also down. The League is concerned not only with home ownership but home rental as well.

Viable Downtown Wheaton

The results of the downtown survey were tabulated. The greatest need expressed was for a downtown grocery/pharmacy/liquor store, which was no surprise. Other types of stores mentioned frequently were department (clothing), book, and office supply/stationery stores. People felt that both independent and national stores should be welcomed. Quality, price and service (in that order) are the top three factors in importance for downtown shoppers. Various opinions were expressed as to the best daytime and evening shopping hours.

There was a desire for a movie theater, but no votes for the kind of theatre that has been proposed. Most agreed that the downtown should be advertised as a destination.

The committee will meet soon to decide on next steps, such as presentation of the results to the proper entities.

League of Voters at Wheaton North

What is Driving the Rapid Rise in U.S. Health Care Costs?

Health care spending in the United States reached \$2.4 trillion in 2007, or \$7,900 per capita. It's projected to reach \$3.1 trillion in 2012 and \$4.3 trillion in 2017 (20% of gross domestic product [GDP])¹. A variety of factors are contributing to this escalation of cost, including:

- *Health Insurance Premiums:* In 2008, employer health insurance premiums increased by 5% or twice the rate of inflation, with an annual premium averaging nearly \$12,700 for an employer health plan covering a family of four.²

- *Administrative Costs:* Administrative overhead can cause health care insurance premiums to balloon: compare Medicare at 3% with an average of commercial carriers at 20%, and investor-owned Blue Cross/Blue Shield at 27%.³
- *Percentage of Total Health Care Costs:* The typical American family of four spent \$15,600 on total health care costs in 2008, or 25% of the combined family income of \$60,000³. In 2003, a comparison of health care costs in the U.S. and Canada found that administration accounted for 31.0 percent of health care expenditures in the United States and 16.7 percent of health care expenditures in Canada.⁴
- *Highly Fragmented System:* A fragmented system is hard for employers and patients to navigate, and leads to inefficient care delivery. Confusing paperwork and rules for multiple insurance programs allow patients to fall through safety nets. Medically, patients are often subjected to duplicate testing and suffer negative drug interactions due to multiple providers and no central medical records system.
- *Bricks and Mortar:* Capital spending drives operating costs and determines the geographic distribution of resources. When operating and capital payments are combined, as they are currently, prosperous hospitals can expand and modernize while impoverished ones cannot, regardless of need or quality.⁵
- *Emphasis on Treatment:* Advancements in clinical treatments, pharmaceuticals, and medical devices are accompanied by increasing costs, including costs of research and development, and advertising directly to patients as well as to providers. *The decision to allow advertising directly to patients has greatly increased the demand for new products and services.*⁶
- *The Uninsured:* Health care for individuals who are uninsured raises the costs for all Americans because providers (physicians, clinics, hospitals) make up the losses by shifting the cost to paying consumers.⁷
- *Impact of Other Insurance:* Often overlooked, the medical expense portions of liability, workers compensation and auto insurance for homes, cars, and businesses also contribute to the cost of health care.⁸

Despite high expenditures for multiple private, state and federal health insurance programs, a Families USA 2009 report, *Americans At Risk*,⁹ found that 86.7 million people—one out of every three Americans under the age of 65—were uninsured for some period of time during 2007 and 2008. These Americans either pay for medical care out of their own pockets or delay needed care altogether. Another 16 million Americans are considered underinsured.¹⁰ This figure puts the 50 percent of consumer bankruptcies in the United States that stem from medical bills into perspective.¹

Chamber to Host Stuff a Truck Food Campaign

Oct. 29-30 Are Young Hearts for Life Screening Days

Residents Appointed to Commissions

The Council approved the appointment of Barbara Dutton and the reappointment of Sherry Torppey to three-year terms on the Historic Commission; and the appointment of Diana Fagans and Paula Sellergren to three-year terms on the Sister City Commission.

Meeting: Oct. 19, 2009

Council OKs Construction of Nursery School

The Wheaton City Council approved ordinances allowing Kensington School to be built at 1746 S. Naperville Road. To construct the nursery school, the applicant needed a special use permit. The applicant agreed to changes suggested by City staff during previous discussions that would replace a fence with taller hedges adjacent to the neighboring property for privacy purposes.

Resident Appointed to Commission

The City Council approved the appointment of Erin Brehm to a three-year term on the Sister City Commission.

Engineering Department Recognized for Public Meetings

The City Council commended the Engineering Department for its Oct. 15 presentation regarding the North Main Street Flood Control Project. The meeting explained the project and what is involved to interested residents. The Engineering Department also will be hosting an informal open house-style meeting regarding the Manchester Road/Wesley Street Bridge Project, where residents can stop by City Hall any time between 4 and 7 p.m. Oct. 28 and discuss the project with the Engineering Department.
