Soon it will be snowing....but that can just wait for now.

WHAT'S GOING ON IN THE LEAGUE RIGHT NOW?

- If you have not paid your **MEMBERSHIP DUES** please take the time to take care of that now. We rely on our members to volunteer to do league work like voter registration, candidate forums and, as you'll see below, taking action of important issues, but we also rely on your financial support to do that important work.

Action Item: Write a check!

- In anticipation of the **2011 LWVIL State Convention**, LWVIL is asking local leagues for input to **State Program Planning**. If you have an idea for a state program item that you think the LWV of Wheaton should promote this is the time to bring it to the board of directors.

Action Item: Please let me know of your interest before the next board meeting on Thursday, November 4th. Read more about it in the memo from Kim Reed, VP Issues, at pages 7 and 8.

- To support the work of the **Responsible Budget Coalition** and to help improve public awareness of the effects of the Illinois fiscal crisis, we are working on a **Survey Project**. Through a brief survey we want to determine direct effects of the crisis in our own community in government (ex. the city, the school district, other public entities) and/or in private sector (ex. housing, social services, youth services including delinquency prevention elder services). The survey results would be used **to educate and offer action** steps to help you and the public get an answer to “what can I do about it?”

Something you should know - Crisis as it involves education: (from Claire McIntyre’s Report LWVIL)

🕒 **Federal Education Job Funds bill:** *On August 10, Congress passed the Education Jobs Funds which will bring \$415 M to Illinois to retain, rehire, or hire school level education staff in order to provide early childhood, elementary, or secondary educational and related services. These funds will be available for disbursement beginning mid-Sept. and is intended primarily for the 2010-2011 school year. These funds will be in addition to the appropriated General State Aid (although there has been some speculation that the money will ‘supplant’ not ‘supplement’ as intended by the jobs bill). This money cannot be used to pay down the backlog of bills from 2009-2010. What schools will do once this money is no longer available is unknown.*

🕒 **Backlog of funds owed schools:** *Currently school districts are owed approximately \$710 M from FY 2010 (school year 2009-10). These bills are expected to be paid by Dec. 2010 out of FY 2011 revenues. This is not much help now as many of the vendors who supply schools are unwilling to continue to wait for the money owed them. This also begs the question as to what the state will use to pay FY 2011 bills if it’s using FY 2011 revenues to pay for FY 2010.*

Action Item: **Two or three volunteers** are needed to help with these brief surveys. Please call Missey by **11/8** if you are willing to help for a couple of hours.

- To support the work of the **Illinois Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty (ICADP)** we will have pre-printed postcards available at league meetings for you to fill in the name of your state representative, senator and the governor urging them to end the death penalty. The cards will be collected by the ICADP to take to Springfield for Lobby Days during the veto session (11/16 and 11/29).

Action Item: If you would be interested in picking up the cards to take to meetings of other organizations that would support this measure, you can pick them up at any league meeting or call me by **11/12**.

RE: LOCAL LEAGUE INPUT TO STATE PROGRAM PLANNING

September 2010

One of the most important responsibilities of local League members at state convention is to select the critical and timely issues that will impact public policy in Illinois. The program planning process offers several opportunities to influence the decisions ultimately made at convention. Recommendations for state program may come in the following forms:

- 1) **Action focus:** An action focus is a high-priority program item adopted by state convention delegates (for example, increasing school funding). After adoption, state and local Leagues act as partners over a two-year period in a concerted effort to promote the goals of the "action focus." LWVIL provides informational material and training to help local Leagues engage in effective action in their local communities, while also engaging in complementary activities at the state level. An action focus recommendation is appropriate if there is an existing state or national position on an issue.
- 2) **Concurrence:** Concurrence means "the act of agreeing with" a position developed by recommendations of a resource committee, decisions formulated by the League board, or positions reached by another league or leagues. Concurrence is an appropriate process when the program recommendation in question is straightforward and non-controversial. Leagues that are considering promoting the adoption or amendment of a state position by concurrence should note the adoption process outlined in the LWVIL bylaws.
- 3) **New Study:** A local League or Leagues can engage in a study to educate members on a public policy issue as a prelude to action. A new study is necessary if there is no League position at any level (local, state or national).

During the program planning process, there are also opportunities to restudy, in other words, modify, change or drop, existing program items. If a local League or Leagues wish to pursue the restudy process, they must plan on taking steps to inform other local Leagues and generate statewide support for a proposed change at state convention.

LOCAL LEAGUE PROMOTION OF A STATE PROGRAM ITEM

Some Leagues may already have an idea for a state program item that they would like to promote early in the state program planning process. When your League is considering an item to promote, the following questions are essential to evaluating a proposed program item:

- Does **your League** have a strong and broad member interest in the issue?
- Is **your League** willing and able to work on the issue, including being part of a statewide committee?
- Is the issue of statewide concern or interest?
- Will timing and political realities permit effective League action?
- Is League involvement likely to make an impact?
- Is there an existing state or national position that can be used as the basis for action? (*Again, if yes, an action focus is needed; if no, a new study is needed.*)

A memo to your fellow Leagues outlining / promoting a program idea may be included in the November State Board Report (SBR) with the other program planning materials, provided camera-ready copy is received in the state office by November 10, 2010. Leagues may promote ideas at any stage of program planning by mail or phone and at convention at their own expense, rather than through the November SBR. It is to your advantage to promote an idea early in the process to generate enthusiasm and support.

THE STATE PROGRAM PLANNING CALENDAR FOR 2010-2011

November 10th: Deadline for local Leagues' camera-ready memos promoting a state program item for inclusion in the Program Planning Packet.

November 21st: Program Planning Packet sent to local Leagues, including: *Status of the State*, report-back form and local League memos.

December - February: Local Leagues develop their program planning recommendations and develop and distribute "lobby" materials for locally proposed program items.

March 7th: Local League Program recommendations due in the state office.

April 16th: The state board considers local League input and makes program recommendations, (budget and bylaws are considered at this board meeting, too).

April 20th: State board program recommendations (budget and bylaws, too) sent to local Leagues.

June 10-12: LWVIL Convention - local Leagues may wish to host a caucus to promote a program item or lobby their fellow delegates to support their favorite item!

Housing Workgroup Meeting

Members of the Housing Workgroup met in October to begin the new year's advocacy efforts and research efforts on affordable housing in Wheaton. All levels of LWV have a position regarding affordable housing on which we may take action. We are reviewing those positions.

We discussed the pertinent issues from our perspectives and the various resources we have available to the League committee.

Included in those resources are DHAC [DuPage Housing Action Coalition] on which the League has served since its inception as well as the Affordable Housing Breakfast which meets on a quarterly basis throughout the year. Also we are connected well with Housing Action Illinois and Business and Professional People for the Public Interest.

We also named agencies in the County which help to meet the housing needs for individuals and families who are living on low and moderate incomes.

We identified the needs we see in our community for affordable housing and listed 5 priorities for our emphasis this year.

1. Research the City's affordable housing priority which has been listed in their documents.
2. Look at inclusion of affordable housing units in any development.
3. Consider advocating for affordable retirement community which would be a Continuous Care Retirement Community [CCRC] such as Wyndemere and Windsor Park.
4. Research the issue of housing/transportation/jobs. The Center for Neighborhood Technology is studying this now and have research and advocacy efforts already.
5. Watch for apartment complexes which are presently serving the affordable housing needs for immigrants and refugees as well as other affordable housing needs in Wheaton.

We will be meeting monthly on the 2nd Thursday of the month at 10:30. If anyone has this interest, please feel free to contact me about joining the efforts of this working committee.

Joan Fefferman, Carol Elias, Louise Florian, Roberta Jacobson, Jan Kay, Missey Wilhelm, and Helen White met on September 21, 2010. We discussed plans for the coming year. We hope to have Dr. Brian Harris, the new District 200 Superintendent, come to speak to the League. We would like him to address the Common Standards that the administration of President Obama is trying to put into place, the shortages in funding from the state and their future effects on our district, as well as his goals and plans for District 200, for the next few years.

The Common Core State Standards is an initiative in both English Language Arts and Mathematics. It has been adopted separately by various states including Illinois, and could be similar to and in line with what will be developed by the Administration: to read about this interesting effort go to www.corestandards.org

LWV's National Study on the role of the federal government in education was adopted in June at the LWVUS convention. The committee and study were defined as follows:

LWVUS Public Education Study Committee

In accordance with the approval of delegates at Convention 2010, the LWVUS will undertake a study of the "Federal Role in Public Education." The study would focus on the role of the federal government in education policymaking, with possible consideration of funding, common standards and/or governance

relationships among all levels of the government. Members of the committee will be responsible for developing study materials and consensus question, participating in reviewing/ tabulating all of the responses submitted by participating Leagues, and based on those, recommending position language to the Board. The LWVUS Board is now seeking applications from members who are interested in being on the study committee. *(Note: the application period is over).*

Oct. 25-31 Recognized as League of Women Voters Week in Wheaton

Wheaton Wins Governor's Home Town Award



Mayor Gresk announced the City of Wheaton received the Governor's Home Town Award for its yearlong 150th anniversary celebration honoring Wheaton's history. To receive the award, City staff compiled an application outlining all of the efforts that went into planning the celebration and gave a presentation to a panel of judges in Springfield. Mayor Gresk and Sesquicentennial Commission members traveled to Springfield on Oct. 12 to accept the award. Councilwoman Liz Corry gave the multimedia presentation the City presented to the judges panel in Springfield, which included a synopsis of the celebration and videos highlighting the major events.

Residents Appointed to City Commissions

The City Council approved the reappointment of Donald Westlake for a three-year term on the Band Commission, the appointment of Jean Lindsey for a three-year term on the Community Media Commission, the appointment of Kathleen Young for a three-year term on the Fine and Cultural Arts Commission, and the reappointment of Howard Grupe for a three-year term on the Environmental Improvement Commission. Mayor Gresk expressed appreciation for Grupe's longtime service on the Environmental Improvement Commission, of which he has been a commissioner since 1978.
